| <p>Lectures and seminars. You will be given directed reading and supported to explore case studies to develop a greater awareness of evidence-based practice and research methods relevant to social work practice. Written and group tasks / assignments will be used to assess the wider learning outcomes of the module (see MASW programme handbook). A flipped learning style approach will be adopted for much of the module, where you will be given prior reading and research, which we will subsequently explore as group.</p> <p>The first component requires students to develop a research question and write a brief literature review related to the question. Students will be supported with developing their research question and introduced to skills of research question formulation as well as carrying out a literature review. This component relates to Learning Outcome 1. Students will then write an evidence-based research briefing about a given social work topic. This will build on the module content, particularly the significance and use of evidence-based practice for social work research and practice. Students will choose their own practice area of interest to explore, and be encouraged to make their choice linked to their final year practice placement setting. This component relates to Learning Outcomes 2 and 3.</p> |
