Module Aims
<p>To enable students to:</p> <p>Critically examine international policy processes in recent and contemporary practice, and to identify and assess the roles and influence of relevant international, government and non-governmental actors in shaping specific foreign policy decisions and outcomes</p>

Outline Syllabus
<p>The module begins by critically reviewing key areas, dimensions and analytical frameworks for understanding international policy development and implementation that you have learned at levels 4 and 5 of this BA Programme; and their relationship with recent policy-making processes in practice. The complexity and contingency of actual policy making processes is then examined, through selected case studies and through evaluation of relevant academic and professional literature on such processes. The roles, capacities, and sources of influence on different actors and professional sectors in these processes are examined. The module will focus on US foreign policy as the key case study for foreign policy processes, providing comparison with other countries such as China, Russia, the UK and Germany, and consider policy processes involving the United Nations and other international institutions.</p> <p>Students will undertake a project which they will further develop their skills and experience relating to aspects of policy processes, supported by an academic tutor. Such projects will run for much of the semester. The topic of the project can be freely chosen subject to approval by the module leader and will focus on an appropriate case study relevant to the aims of the module.</p>
